Working with a wide variety of state and federal agencies, the General Land Office organizes an annual Border Energy Forum to bring together energy experts, government officials and business leaders from both sides of the border. They discuss the region's current and future energy needs and their relationship to the environment. After a successful 14<sup>th</sup> annual Forum in San Diego in October 2007, the 15<sup>th</sup> annual Border Energy Forum is scheduled for Monterrey, Nuevo León, on October 23 and 24, 2008. The Forum will meet in Houston in 2009; it has been held in Texas more than in any other state.

b. The border program has started a bilingual energy education project working with counterpart agencies in neighboring states. Using grant funds from the EPA, it also is installing a demonstration photovoltaic solar project in San Benito.

c. The Land Office's Oil Spill Prevention and Response Program also works with the U.S. Coast Guard and the Mexican Navy on major oil spill drills to test coordination in case disaster should ever strike
