Early Voting Period

- Early voting begins **17 days before** election day
 - If the 17th day falls on a **weekend**, it is extended to the next **regular business day**
- Early voting ends **4 days before** election day
 - Primary Runoff Early Voting: 10 days before election day to 4 days before election day



Early Voting Period

Early Voting for the 2026 Primary Elections:

- Tuesday, February 17, 2026* through Friday, February 27, 2026

*No voting will occur on Monday, February 16, 2026 because of Presidents' Day

Main Early Voting Polling Place

- **Location:** Any room selected by the early voting clerk in the building that houses the **main office** of the county clerk
- **Hours:** Each weekday of the early voting period that is not a legal state holiday for at **least 9 hours**
 - Voting may **not** be conducted earlier than 6am or later than 10pm

[Secs. 85.002, 85.005]



Main Early Voting Polling Place

- Extended **weekday** early voting hours apply to ALL counties regardless of population size
- The main early voting location must be open for **at least 12 consecutive hours** each **weekday** of the **last week** of early voting
 - Voting may **not** be conducted earlier than 6am or later than 10pm



Main Early Voting Polling Place

- Extended **weekend** early voting hours apply to ALL counties regardless of population size
- At least 12 consecutive hours the last **Saturday** of early voting
 - Voting may **not** be conducted earlier than 6am or later than 10pm
- At least 6 consecutive hours the last **Sunday** of early voting
 - Voting may **not** be conducted earlier than 9am or later than 10pm

Mandatory Temporary Branch Locations

- Counties conducting a **primary election**, general election for state and county officers, or a special election to fill a vacancy in the legislature or Congress **MUST** establish **temporary branch polling places** as follows:

Mandatory Temporary Branch Locations

- In a county with a population of **400,000 or more**, the commissioners court must establish one or more temporary polling places, other than the main early voting polling place, in **each state representative district** containing territory covered by the election.
 - The early voting clerk is the authority responsible for establishing temporary branch polling places.



Mandatory Temporary Branch Locations

- In a county with a population of **120,000 or more but less than 400,000**, the commissioners court must establish one or more temporary polling places, other than the main early voting polling place, in **each commissioners precinct** containing territory covered by the election.
 - The early voting clerk is the authority responsible for establishing temporary branch polling places.



Mandatory Temporary Branch Locations

- In a county with a population of **100,000 or more but less than 120,000**, the early voting clerk must establish one or more early voting polling places in each commissioners precinct for which the early voting clerk **receives a timely filed written request** submitted by at least 15 registered voters of that precinct.
 - The written request must be received in time to enable compliance with Section 85.067 of the Code.
 - The early voting clerk is the authority responsible for establishing temporary branch polling places.



Mandatory Temporary Branch Locations

- Primary election, the general election for state and county officers, or a special election to fill a vacancy in the legislature or congress: the early voting clerk **MUST** order **weekend** early voting at each mandatory temporary branch (branches established under Sec. 85.062(d)).



Temporary Branch Locations

- Voting at a temporary branch polling place must be conducted on the days that early voting is required to be conducted at the main early voting polling place and remain open for at least **8 hours** each day.



Temporary Branch Locations

- The county may add **additional** branch locations during the early voting period.
- However, once the branch location is opened, it **must** remain open all the same **weekdays** as the main early voting location for at least 8 hours a day.
 - The county must still meet the **5-day notice requirement** for the additional branches. (Sec. 85.067)
 - It is **NOT** possible to **remove** branch locations at any time.



Notice of Election

The Election Notice **must** state:

- Type and date of the election;
- Location of the main early voting polling place, including the street address, room number, and building name. The notice must **designate** which location is the **main early voting polling place**;
- Location of each polling place, including the street address, room number, and building name;
- Hours the polls will be open;
- Regular dates and hours for early voting by personal appearance;
- Dates and hours of any Saturday or Sunday early voting;
- Early voting clerk's official mailing address or street address at which the clerk may receive delivery by common or contract carrier, if different, phone number, e-mail address, and the Internet website, if the early voting clerk has an Internet website;
- ***Recommended***: information regarding branch early voting locations.

Additionally, the notice **must** be posted on the county's website.



Types of Early Voting

- In-Person Voting
 - Main early voting polling place
 - Limited ballots
 - Other special forms of early voting
 - Temporary branch
 - Curbside
- Voting by Mail



Reminder

Any voter can vote at any early voting location.



Main Early Voting Polling Place

- Serves as a voting location for **all voters**
- Certain things can **only occur** at the main early voting location:
 - Limited ballots
 - Cancellation of mail ballots
 - Other special forms of early voting



Limited Ballots

- Used when a voter has a registration in a county *other than* their new county of residence
- **Only** an option during **early voting** and **cannot** be used on election day
- Used **only** at the main EV location



Limited Ballots

To vote a limited ballot, a voter **must** meet the following:

- Eligible to vote in the county of registration if they still live there,
- Registered to vote in the county of former residence at the time the person:
 - offers to vote in the new county of residence, or
 - submitted a voter registration application in the county of new residence, and
- Their registration will not be effective in their new county of residence by election day



Limited Ballots (Mail Voter)

- A **mail voter** can also vote a limited ballot
 - However, they **must** meet other **requirements** to vote by mail under Chapter 82



Limited Ballots

Limited Ballot Reminders

- The limited ballot application is a **voter registration application** and will **update** the voter's registration to your county, if they are otherwise eligible.
- **Train all your early voting workers on this process.**
 - A common complaint we get is that a voter will go to a polling location and the worker does not inform the voter of this option.



Limited Ballot Reminders

- Do **NOT** send voters back to their **old county** to vote
- There is no such thing as “fail-safe” voting for these voters – the only way they can legally vote is to vote the limited ballot in their new county during early voting
- Do **NOT** provide a provisional ballot to these voters, they are eligible for a regular ballot*

*Voter could be given a provisional ballot for Voter ID reasons, if they do not present a proper ID.

Emergency Early Voting Ballot Due to Sickness or Disability

- Available to voters who because of a sickness or physical disability, which originated **on or after** the ABBM deadline, are unable to attend the polls
- Requires a Physician's Certificate
- Voter will use a **representative** to deliver the application, transport balloting materials, and deliver their marked ballot

Emergency Early Voting Ballot Due to Death in the Family

- Available to voters who will be absent from the county on election day because of a death in the family (within the 2nd degree of blood or marriage)
- The death must have occurred on or after the day before the last day of the early voting period



Curbside Voting

- If a voter is **physically unable** to enter the polling place without personal assistance or likelihood of injuring the voter's health, then an election officer shall **deliver** a ballot or voting machine to the voter at the polling place entrance or curb on the voter's request.
 - Election workers should **NOT ask** voters about their disability
- Curbside voting **MUST** be available at **ALL** polling locations during early voting and on election day.

Curbside Voting

- Voters who vote through the curbside voting process must be provided the **same procedures** and accommodations for voting as other voters, including the use of electronic pollbook devices for the check-in process.
 - If all voters are checked in at the polling place using electronic pollbook equipment, then the same process should be used for curbside voters.



Curbside Voting

- When individuals vote curbside, their **car becomes their voting station.**
- Curbside voters must be afforded the opportunity to vote their ballot **privately** (in the same way as a voter in the voting booth) and thus are entitled to vote without the interference of campaigns or bystanders.
 - The presiding judge has the authority to preserve order and prevent breaches of peace if there are individuals harassing voters while they vote curbside.

Curbside Voting

- Each polling place must provide a **reserved area** for curbside
- The designated area must be clearly marked with a **sign** indicating that the space is reserved for use by a voter who is unable to enter the polling place.
 - See Forms [7-43](#) and [7-44](#)
- The designated area must also include a **method** for the voter to notify the election officers at the polling place that the voter wishes to vote curbside.



Curbside Voting

Notification by Phone

- Displaying a phone number a voter must **call or text** to request assistance.

Notification by Ringing Bell

- Provide a button or intercom a voter may use to request assistance.

Ballots

- Early Voting Clerk's initials:
 - on the back of each paper ballot to be used at the early voting location
- DREs: There is no requirement for initials on these voting system ballots.
 - The printed cast vote record should contain the initials on the back of the ballot.
- Ballot Marking Devices:
 - The printed ballot should contain the initials on the back of the ballot.
 - A jurisdiction can comply with this requirement by pre-signing or initialing ballots before distributing the ballot stock to the voters or before placing the blank ballot stock in the printer tray used by the ballot marking device.



Early Voting Roster

EV Clerks shall maintain a roster for each election listing who votes early in person and who is mailed a ballot by mail.

- Roster must be updated daily.

Roster must include:

- Name, address, VUID
- Voter's county election precinct of registration
- Date of voting by personal appearance or date ballot was mailed to the voter
- **Recommendation:** We recommend that you create two rosters for your mail ballots—one for ballots that have been mailed but not returned and a separate list of ballots by mail that have been received.



Early Voting Roster

- If an early voting clerk **fails** to post their early voting rosters in accordance with Section 87.121, a person registered to vote in the county where the early voting clerk is conducting early voting may **file a complaint** with the Secretary of State regarding the early voting clerk's noncompliance.
- The Office of the Secretary of State maintains a system for receiving and recording these complaints.
